	Stukus says telehealth allows providers to see more patients: "Telehealth will allow physicians to see more patients and see them more frequently than they normally would if they had to wait to schedule an appointment in the office." :08
CG: David Stukus, MD Nationwide Children's Hospital	Stukus describes what can be accomplished via telehealth: "A lot of the care that pediatricians and pediatric specialists provide is really providing the most accurate diagnosis, which we can obtain through a detailed clinical history which we can still obtain through telehealth, we can do physical exams for the most part as well and then we can participate in shared decision making with families to help offer our guidance in regards to the most likely diagnosis as well as potential treatment plans that we can pursue and then follow up in the future." :25

CG: David Stukus, MD Nationwide Children's Hospital	Stukus says telehealth allows him to provide care while being cautious: "It has really allowed us to rapidly expand our telehealth services so that we can continue to provide outstanding clinical care to all of our patients, even if we can't see them in an office setting, which is really out of an abundance of caution." :14 Stukus says telehealth helps stop the spread of the virus: "We can reduce the risk that our patients and their families get exposed to COVID-19, we'll reduce the risk that staff will get exposed, and the trickle-down effect of this is just enormous." :10
CG: Ujjwal Ramtekkar, MD Nationwide Children's Hospital	Ramtekkar says telepsychiatry helps serve children in rural areas: "We have been providing telepsychiatry services to few rural clinics in the primary care setting. This allows the children to get the psychiatric services without ever leaving their town and the community." :12 Ramtekkar says it's important to continue regular behavioral health vitis: "This is also a very difficult time for all the children who are already at risk of emotional difficulties. It is very important that these children continue to receive the services that they were receiving for behavioral health prior to all the restrictions in place." :15
CG: Jane Abel Mom	Jane recommends telehealth services to other patients: "If your doctor is offering this service, I would definitely take advantage of it. It was very convenient, all of my concerns were answered and I don't have to wait, I mean, we don't know how long this is going to go on, a matter of weeks or months. We don't have to wait for an appointment and get the medical care we needed." :18 Jane says she would seek out telehealth services in the future: "I would definitely take advantage of telehealth services if the opportunity presented itself to do so again in the future. It was incredibly easy, and again, I don't feel like we missed out on any of the aspects of physically being in the doctor's office today." :17 Jane says having the appointment gave her peace of mind: "It definitely gives me, as a parent, peace of mind knowing that I'm not going to run out of her prescriptions that she needs, that her appointment for the year is done." :13

CG: Ellie Abel Asthma and allergy patient	Ellie describes the telehealth conversation she had with her doctor: "We talked about my asthma and like maybe some new treatments and medicine I'll be doing. And we also talked about my peanut allergy and also kind of the same things along the lines of new treatments and medication and stuff like that, and how I've been doing with it all." :16 Ellie says her telehealth appointment was comfortable and easy::

CG: Dale Heydlauff President, American Electric Power Foundation	Heydlauff says COVID-19 has proven the need for telehealth: "The COVID-19 crisis has proven the efficacy of telemedicine in ways we never dreamed. What it has done, by the sheer force of the demands on the healthcare system, is allow us to leverage technology to provide the same quality and level of care from a distance." :18
	Heydlauff says telehealth helps protect patients from the virus: "This, in my mind, has been an enormous benefit to society, especially as we try to treat those patients who are not infected with COVID-19, but instead have other symptoms that need to be addressed by a qualified physician, but don't need to put those patients at risk by bringing them into a facility or traveling into a facility where they could come in contact with someone who has been infected." :25

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
