Study: Furniture and TV tip-overs send a child to a U.S. emergency department every 46 minutes

Experts say current standards are inadequate, call for strengthened mandates for stability and injury prevention

"Young children are at especially high risk for injuries to the head and neck. In fact, children under six are almost twice as likely to have a concussion or a closed head injury compared to older children.":12

PARENTS CAN HELP PREVENT INJURIES BY USING DEVICES DESIGNED TO ANCHOR FURNITURE AND T-VS TO THE WALL.

REMOVING OBJECTS FROM THE TOP OF FURNITURE LIKE TOYS OR STUFFED ANIMALS THAT MIGHT TEMPT A CHILD TO CLIMB OR PULL THEMSELVES UP TO REACH THEM IS ALSO IMPORTANT.: 13

"While straps and anchors are absolutely important and parents should use them, we need to do much more to prevent these injuries. And that's why we need manufacturers to step up and to make their products more stable to begin with.":13

CURRENT STABILITY STANDARDS² DO NOT ACCOUNT FOR COMMON HOUSEHOLD CONDITIONS LIKE CARPETED SURFACES AND DRAWERS FILLED WITH OBJECTS OR CLOTHING.

AND ALTHOUGH TIP PREVENTION DEVICES, SUCH AS ANCHOR STRAPS, ARE PART OF THESE STANDARDS FOR CERTAIN FURNITURE, MANUFACTURERS OFTEN DON'T INCLUDE THEM AND PARENTS MAY NOT HAVE THE TOOLS OR SKILLS TO INSTALL THEM.

A BILL IS CURRENTLY MAKING ITS WAY THROUGH CONGRESS THAT WOULD REQUIRE DEVELOPMENT OF STRICTER STANDARDS THAT WOULD BETTER PROTECT CHILDREN FROM TIP-OVERS.

Smith says small children are injured while climbing on furniture:

"They often see dressers and other types of furniture as climbing opportunities. They pull out a drawer and use it as a step, and that often leads to the tipping over of the furniture on top of them, and that can result in very serious injury and even death.":14

CG: Gary Smith, MD, DrPh Nationwide Children's Hospital Smith says safety standards need to be strengthened and enforced:

"Safety education, warning labels, and the use of anti-tip devices such as straps, while very important, aren't enough. We need to strengthen, and then enforce, the current tip over standards for clothing storage units and TVs.":19

Smith says toys and attractive items should not be placed on furniture or TVs:

"TV remote controls, toys, and other attractive items for young children should not be placed up on top of the TV

or on top of the furniture that's supporting a TV, because that will encourage children to climb up to try to reach them, and that may cause a tip over.":14

Smith says current voluntary safety standards are inadequate: "The current voluntary standard for clothing units is woefully inadequate when it comes to its stability tests. It doesn't mimic the real world reality of where these units are installed in people's homes.":15

Smith says place TVs on furniture designed to support it and anchor both to the wall:

"If a parent decides to place a TV on top of furniture, they should use a TV stand or an entertainment center. 40:14 Those types of furniture are designed for that purpose and are more stable. They should then anchor both the TV and the furniture to the wall.":16

Smith say he hopes proposed policy changes are successful: "A bill has recently passed the US House of Representatives and is awaiting action in the Senate. We also have a new rule that's been proposed by the Consumer Product Safety Commission to increase the stability of clothing storage units. We'd really like to see both of those efforts succeed." :17
