Largest study to date shows simple therapy can be more effective than medicine

CG: Mark Boguniewicz MD National Jewish Health	Boguniewicz talks about the worst cases of atopic dermatitis - "Literally, some of our patients look like they've been boiled. And so, that is incredibly difficult to deal with, it's very painful." :10
	Boguniewicz talks about concerns about common therapies - "We know that some of the medications that we prescribe, topical steroids being the most common, you know, that our families have concerns about using them, especially in a chronic manner." :12
	Boguniewicz talks about timing of the wet wrap approach - "After about 2 hours they've probably gotten the maximum benefit out of that wet wrap treatment. So we'll do that, once, twice, three times a day." :11
	Boguniewicz talks about stepping down the approach to wet wraps - "As those patients get better, we are very select where we want to wrap, so it doesn't make sense to do total body wraps in somebody who has really severe disease on their ankles and elbows." :13
CG: Heather Karazim Daughter has eczema	Heather talks about Lucie's first symptoms - "It was right around 4 months old when there were some really bad skin patches on her arms and legs." :08
	Heather talks about the challenge of trying to get a diagnosis - "We saw a pediatrician who then recommended that we see a dermatologist and then the dermatologist recommended we see the allergist. And that was all that was right around when she was 6 months old." :13

Daughter has eczema	"It just, it makes sense and it works. And the best part was,we were able to back off a lot of our medications when we left and we just established a new baseline for her." :11
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
