	Dr. Ogbogu talks about who can have EoE - "We see it in both adults and we see it in children, and depending on the age of the patient we sort of see a different patient presentation, but it all stems down to having problems with swallowing." Dr. Ogbogu explains EoE symptoms -
CG: Dr. Princess Ogbogu Ohio State's Wexner Medical Center	"In adults, we tend to see more symptoms of difficulty swallowing, so if they eat something they might feel like it gets stuck. They might feel like they need to take extra drinks of water to push it down."
	Dr. Ogbogu explains the need for more research - "So we know there's certainly a link to food allergy, possibly, and environmental allergies, but there's still a lot of research to be done in this field."
	Lutz explains how bad the symptoms were - "I was going to the store to buy liquid Tylenol cause I didn't want to take the pill because it would become lodged in my throat."
CG: Andy Lutz Has eosinophilic esophagitis	Lutz explains how his EOE is difficult to track at times - "There's been a number of times where it's kind of snuck up on me. I've had foods that I've eaten for years, and all of a sudden they add peas as a small ingredient, and I eat that food and I'm allergic to that food, so it's happened with strange things that you wouldn't expect."
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
