#### **EXTRA BITES**

Veale talks about the process of living donation "Because you're giving them living donor kidneys, and
starting chains, and expanding the pool, every chain
gives five transplantations. You're actually pulling
people off the deceased donor list because they're
getting living donor kidneys."

CG: Jeffrey Veale, MD Ronald Reagan UCLA Medical Center Veale talks about advantages to living donors "Twenty percent of the deceased donor wait list is
people who are waiting for their second, third, fourth
transplant. So, in order to reduce the list, you're not
only giving more kidneys, but you're giving
higher-quality kidneys that last longer."

Veale compares living donor kidneys to others "A living donor kidney functions for 20 years on
average. Where a deceased donor kidney functions
for 10 to 12 year on average. So, you're giving
high-quality kidneys that function longer, and you're
taking more people off the deceased donor wait list."

Veale says more may donate with voucher idea "That's why there would be an influx of living donors
and why it would probably be one of the biggest
changes to the field. I mean, this would be
groundbreaking."

Broadman explains Quinn's condition -

"We knew before he was born that he only had one kidney, but we thought it was a fully developed kidney. As it turned out, it isn't."

## CG: Howard Broadman Came up with kidney voucher idea

Broadman talks about the idea of a voucher "I've come up with this idea and if it helps people, it's
a game-changer. And it's really, really cool for those
people who aren't going to be suffering."

Broadman was determined to help grandson "For me, it was pretty simple. We've got to fix this.
This is a problem. We've got all these people, and
now one of them is mine - and we've got an
opportunity to fix this."

Broadman reflects on the program he initiated - "I may be changing people's lives. And that's huge."
