	Dr. Veale talks about the need for regifting transplants: "There's about 30,000,000 people in the United States with chronic kidney disease. So they're approaching end stage renal failure. They're not on dialysis yet. But they know in the next 5 or 10 years, they're going to need a kidney transplant."
CG: Jeffrey Veale, MD Ronald Reagan UCLA Medical Center	Dr. Veale talks about the impact of re-transplanting kidneys: "Even if it saved five lives, even if we did this and it saved five lives, can you imagine if it was your life on dialysis?"
	Dr. Veale talks about changing the perspective of the transplant community: <i>"If we can do more and more of these, I think this could</i> <i>go from being outside of the box and being very unusual</i> <i>to being much more commonplace and helping many</i> <i>more people. We just have to have an open mind."</i>
CG: Vertis Boyce Kidney transplant recipient	Vertis discusses how getting a kidney changed her life: "I'm just so grateful to this family. It's just like, a blessing. That's the best way I can explain it. I feel freer, and I know I'm on the road to a more fulfilled life. I have a six year old grand baby that I thought I wouldn't live to see grow up. I think I will be there now."
CG: Linda Maldonado Sister of second donor, Beto	Linda talks about their family's view of organ donation: "They helped him and we were able to see him and have him with us for more years than what he was going to live if he didn't have a kidney. And we just thought, they gave him that gift, why not us give that gift to somebody, why not help another family if we can?"
	Linda talks about how it feels to meet her brother's recipient: "It's an honor to meet her and to see that she actually wanted to meet us. Never in a million years did I think I was gonna be able to meet her, so it's very exciting. There's a lot of feelings and emotions and one that can't really explain, but it's a really good feeling."
