She was deemed too "high risk" for surgery but the transplant team at UCLA accepted the challenge of treating her

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CG: Abbas Ardehali, MD Ronald Reagan UCLA Medical Center	Ardehali says Miriam's case was rejected a lot of places due to the risk: "She was rejected at the local centers, and the physicians there were actually willing to refer her case to several other centers throughout the country on the east coast as well as the midwest, and she was deemed to be too high risk at all of the other centers." :17 Ardehali says complicated cases require a multidisciplinary approach: "It requires a multidisciplinary approach involving multiple team members, from the lung specialist to infectious diagona to people who are epople
	disease to people who are specialized in what we call immunogenetics or management of the antibodies or proteins in the circulating blood." :18
	Ardehali says Miriam is a survivor and he credits her family's perseverance: "She is, in my opinion, is a survivor and someone who has beaten the odds, and a lot of credit has to go to her and her family for their courage, their commitment and their determination to persevere." :19
CG: Miriam Merianos Lung transplant patient	Ardehali says performing high-risk transplants allows them to advance the field: "We are routinely offering lung transplantation to this cohort of patients, and more importantly, we are doing it in a thoughtful way so that we can publish the information to ensure that the rest of the country and the rest of the world is aware so that they can continue to offer this lifesaving treatment to those patients in need." :18
	Miriam explains how a cold quickly became serious: "They said, 'Oh, it's just a cold. You know, we'll give you some antibiotics and you should be good to go.' I said, 'Okay.' The second day came, still didn't feel good. By the third day I told my husband, 'My chest is getting tighter and tighter and I'm having difficulty breathing now." :17
	Miriam says she lived a healthy lifestyle before getting sick: "I've never smoked in my life or drank in my life. As a matter of fact, for the past 10 years I've been living a healthier lifestyle, exercising every day, eating properly, water, no soft drinks, sugar, just being very precautious of my health, so how did I end up in this stage? How did this happen?" :20

	Elaine describes her relief when UCLA took her mom's case: "Having Dr. Ardehali step in and say, 'I will take this complicated case,' is life changing. We closed up the books and we closed up the emails and said, 'UCLA, we're going back home.'" :10
CG: Elaine Kramer Daughter of lung transplant recipient	Elaine describes her mom's incredible transformation after surgery: <i>"My mom went from being bedridden to now bossing us around, back to her normal self. She's planning baby showers, she's washing laundry. She's waking us up and telling us breakfast time. I mean, it's Mom." :18</i>
	Elaine says her mom's will to live made them fight harder for her: "We knew my mom wanted to live. My mom wanted to see milestones and she wanted to be around. Knowing that and having asked her what she would want, our voice became stronger for her." :14
